Connecting with Today's Children

Welcome

Picture the different ways that children come to kindergarten- some will bounce in, raring to go and feeling at home, others may come in cautiously, unwilling to enter on their own. One child timidly clings to mother, another crawls under a table and will not play with the other children, while some children become so physically boisterous that other children do not want to play with them.

As children grow some will develop anxieties, struggle socially or bring over-active behaviour to the classroom. How does a teacher, therapist, doctor or nurse find imaginative ways to transform or 'heal' this behaviour?

We are finding that a growing number of children develop uncontrolled and unreasonable behaviour. Eventually we have children and adults who have generalized anxiety disorder (GAD) or obsessive - compulsive disorders (OCD), autism spectrum disorder (ASD) and attention deficit disorder (ADD).

Learning difficulties and inappropriate behaviour are stressful to the child and to the children and the adults around them. How can we help support these children to bring balance into their daily lives? What are the gifts they bring? This conference will look at these phenomena, work towards answers and provide some practical advice.

The conference begins with an introduction by a doctor and a teacher, sharing how we may form a connection with today's child. Although we may experience sympathy or rejection for these children, neither of these reactions are helpful. On the first evening we will explore *the gift of empathy* because without it we cannot meaningfully connect. How do we arrive at an understanding that we are all dependant on each other? How do we recognise that we all have something deep inside us that is valuable and worth listening to and that through our understanding of each other we can believe in

ourselves and reveal our true spirit?

Healing has been defined as 'a bringing into balance' and our next three days have a rhythm: singing, exploring the day's theme through art (feeling), coming to an understanding through a lecture (thinking) and then a practical workshop to gain new skills (will). For members of the School of Spiritual Science the day starts with a reading and discussion of one of the Class Lessons (please bring your blue membership card); after breakfast we start with a verse which talks about education as a healing process. At the end of each day there will be short presentations as to how some experienced teachers and health professionals have managed specific behaviours and there will also be a range of social activities in the evening.

On the final day of the conference, the panel will answer questions and draw together the threads and experiences of the conference.

The conference closes with a lecture on 'Meeting the Challenges of the 21st Century for Children' by Dr Michaela Glöckler.

Dr Michaela Glöckler

A former pediatrician who is the Leader of the Medical Section of the School of Spiritual Science at the Goetheanum, in Dornach, Switzerland. She worked at Heedecke Community Hospital and served as a school doctor in Witten. She runs the International Anthroposophic Medical Training.

Florian Oswald

First studied process engineering. After working in a Camphill he became a teacher for special needs children and later attended the teacher seminar in Dornach. He is currently a science and mathematics teacher at the Berne Rudolf Steiner High School, Switzerland and is an international advisor on pedagogical matters.

John Angus

New Zealand's Children's Commissioner.

John Angus began his career as an historian after obtaining a doctorate in history from Otago University. He went on to complete a diploma in social work and spent almost 10 years as a social worker in Dunedin.

Connecting with Today's Children Workshops

1. **What can the upper school contribute to a healthy development of body, soul and spirit?**

In this workshop we will explore the relationship of the 'I' (ego) to the physical body through a pedagogical – artistic approach. The healthy art of teaching is achieved within each individual lesson when the relationship of the 'I' (ego) to the body is brought into balance.

Facilitator: Florian Oswald - see Speakers & Presenters page..

2. **Therapeutic Storytelling as a Practical tool for Working with the Modern Young Child. (Birth to 7 years).**

Story telling can create imaginative pictures which allow children alternative options for behaviour or ways of being in the world. This workshop will take the daily conference theme and look at fairy tales, myths and legends, therapeutic and biographical stories in order to help us find the imaginative keys to open doors for the children in our care.

Facilitator: Marjorie Theyer has worked in Steiner Education for the past 40 years both in New Zealand and in Asia. She is currently the Early Childhood Advisor for the Federation of Rudolf Steiner Schools in New Zealand.

3. **Accompanying and supporting a child's journey by listening to your heart.**

This workshop will explore the experience of a parent dealing with a child with sensory issues: all the stages of the journey: overcoming anxiety, confronting reality, taking positive action, and working holistically with therapists, teachers and doctors. Taking a long-term perspective and seeing the child as a

whole picture, can lead to a path of transformation and growth.

Facilitator: Laura Hurtado-Roberts has a child in a Steiner school. She has a background in research and lecturing in social sciences and communication, and is presently doing community work in the field of learning difficulties in the Wellington region. She is currently training in Extra Lesson.

4. **Transforming Anxiety in Parent and Child.**

Today's children, more than ever before, have difficulty 'meeting the other'. This workshop will teach participants a way to understand the effects of anxiety on both parents and children. It gives a simple but effective language and model to translate the complexities of stimulus and response, spirit and incarnation, into tools that can be understood by everyone and used by both parents and teachers..

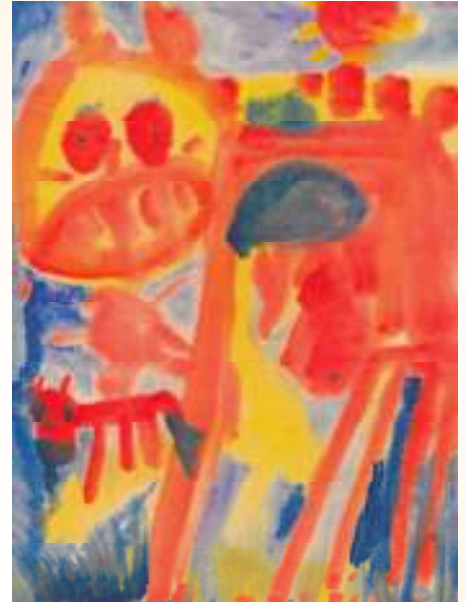
5. **Discovering Fairytales through Colour.**

Through the medium of colour in water colour, and fairy tale motifs participants will experience how colour can be rediscovered as a healing art.

Facilitator: Susie Gay trained as an Art teacher at the Painting School of the Goetheum and as an Art Therapist in Germany. She has trained as a counsellor and Steiner class teacher.

6. **The Hearing Word as Experienced through Archetypal Sounds and Sequence.**

This workshop will give participants a practical experience of how archetypal sounds and their sequence can be applied to curative education and adapted to individual cases.



Facilitator: Norbert Mulholland and Uta Stoll Kuwilsky. Norbert is a trained speech and drama teacher and has been working in special education for over 20 years as a speech therapist, adult educator and speech artist. Uta has been working as a Eurythmist for 30 years. She trained as a eurythmy therapist 15 years ago and works mainly with children in need of special care.

7. **Creating Classroom Culture.**
This workshop will explore social class dynamics through drama, stories and breathing.
Facilitator: Brian Tracey has been a class teacher for 18 years at Titi-rangi Rudolf Steiner School and is currently the programme director for the In-Service Teachers' course at Taruna College.
8. **Form Drawing.**
Through many years of practice Rosie has a strong conviction that Form Drawing, "the art of line", needs to be understood and used by teachers as a fundamental and therapeutic tool for health, breathing and balance of students, and of the class as a whole.
Facilitator: Rosie Simpson is currently the principal of Taikura Rudolf Steiner School in Hastings. She has been involved in Waldorf

Education for 28 years as a class teacher, a curative educator, and as a developer and teacher of adult education programmes at both Taruna College and Hohepa.

9. **Choir Chimes as a Class Activity.**

We will create a workshop where participants can experience playing and teaching choir chimes as an inclusive class activity bringing into balance harmony and rhythm in the human soul.

Facilitator: **David Ureli** has been a maths and science Steiner High School teacher for many years

10. **Opening the Path of Incarnation, Light and Darkness as described by Collot d'Herbois.**

A workshop with practical exercises for participants to experience the effects of light and darkness as a healing force.

Facilitator: **Neeltje Bollen and Dr Ulrich Doering.** Neeltje is an Anthroposophic Art therapist who has worked extensively with Collot d'Herbois and Ulrich is an Anthroposophic doctor working in Titirangi, Auckland.

11. **Empathising with Children on the Autism Spectrum.**

Drawing primarily on insights from autistic individuals, together with those from anthroposophic, other holistic and mainstream approaches, this workshop will explore how anxiety, hyperactivity and sensori-motor issues are commonly associated with autism.

Facilitator: **Dr Ruth Baker** see Speakers & Presenters page.

12. **Movement as a Creative Key to the Truly Human.**

This will be an active workshop where participants will learn to understand how gesture and movement guide the

child in their development and how to change the tempo from driven to breathing.

Facilitator: **Sue Simpson** see Speakers & Presenters page.

13. **Meeting the Sensory Needs of the Child in the Classroom.**

Perceptual motor and sensory processing difficulties affect a large number of children. This workshop is about understanding and accommodating their needs to facilitate the learning process.

We will develop an understanding of the senses based on the twelve senses described by Rudolf Steiner. Learn about sensory integration and sensory integrative difficulties, and their relationship to learning problems.

Explore the term "sensory processing". How do we personally process sensory information - what do we enjoy, what do we dislike. What produces anxiety, what makes us calm.

Facilitators: **Robyn Ritchie & Emma Ratcliff** are Occupational Therapists at Helios Integrative medical Centre in Christchurch

14. **The 9 year Rubicon, the Birth of the Etheric Heart and Puberty.**

This workshop will explore what happens in development at these three major stages in relation to the three themes of the conference and how we can support and understand children at those important times.

Facilitators: **Neil Carter and Dr David Ritchie.** Neil Carter has been a class teacher for many years at the Christchurch Rudolf Steiner School and David - see Speakers & Presenters page..

15. **Compassionate Communication as a Way of Seeing.**

"A change in the way of seeing is a



change in what is seen." In these sessions participants will explore questions on how to develop empathy, understanding, harmony and wholeness through human encounter.

Facilitator: **John Cunningham** - see Speakers & Presenters page.

16. **Creative Speech as a Tool for the Class Teacher to Address the Challenges of the Modern Child.**

In this workshop participants will look at exercises and texts related to the theme addressed each day, to find healing ways to work with the modern child.

Facilitator: **Astrid Anderson** is an Anthroposophic speech therapist working with children and adults. Creative speech works through rhythm, dynamic gesture and content which can address the individual children in a class context.

17. **The Healing Art of Puppetry.**

In this workshop participants will look at the importance and therapeutic value of puppet stories in early childhood. This will lead to an understanding of how puppetry supports children in their natural incarnation process. Consideration will be given to a range of labelled 'conditions' or states of being that

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modern children display as per the theme of the conference.

Facilitators: Helen Bedyne and Edith van der Meer. Helen has been an early childhood teacher and educator for many years. Edith was a handwork teacher at the Taikura Steiner School and now works as an early childhood teacher in Taradale and is a co-director of the In-Service early childhood course at Taruna College.

18. The Social and Spatial benefits of Pedagogical Eurythmy.

The workshop will include practical execution of exercises used within the curriculum to enhance the awareness of the social aspect of eurythmy. Participants will look at how spatial awareness enhances the ability of the child to 'feel' himself in space.

Facilitator: Mynda Mansfield trained as a Eurythmist in Cape Town and currently teaches at classes 1-7 at the Waikato Waldorf School.

19. The Ability to Play as One of the Principal Criteria for Mental Health.

In this workshop participants will look at the vital role of play in early childhood. Given the relationship between health and play, there are serious implications for the demise of play for children's mental and physical health. Children who are anxious, socially withdrawn and over active can find it difficult to play. Together we will look at ways in which these modern phenomena can be addressed.

Facilitator: Kathy MacFarlane has been an early childhood teacher for the past 20 years and is a co-director of the early childhood in-service programme at Taruna College.

20. Extra Lesson - Extending the Art of Teaching and accepting Children with Anxiety, Over Activity and Social Struggles.

This workshop will look at the needs of children from a developmental perspective. It will promote understanding of the challenges these children face, as well as explore exercises and techniques that may assist their learning.

Facilitator: Annette Brian - see Speakers & Presenters page.

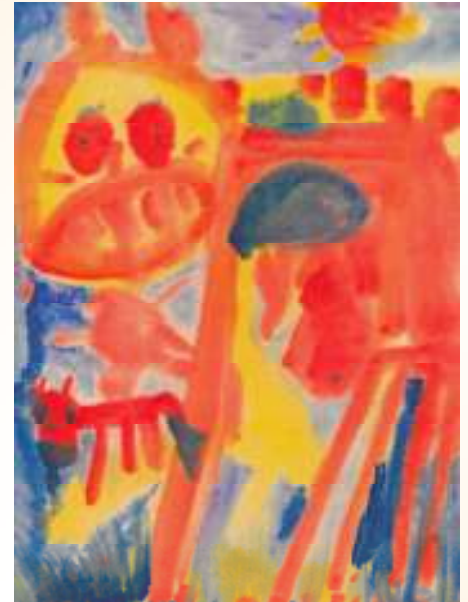
21. Archetypal Movement Patterns and Infant Reflex Integration as Part of Rhythmic Work.

This workshop gives an introduction into the developmental stages of infant movement integration as they are archetypally meant to be. In case of retained reflex patterns, a variety of behavioural traces can be found in the school child. The course participants will actively go through the developmental stages and will learn different movement activities to mature infant reflex patterns at a later stage.

Facilitator: Edith Bulle. has been an Extra Lesson teacher for the past 25 years.

22. Working with at Risk Adolescence from a perspective of Respect.

This workshop will examine the gifts that these very at risk young people bring to the world. Every challenging young person has hidden treasures and my job as a therapist/counsellor is to find their gifts, hold them with utter care, polish them up and return them to the young person to build upon for the rest of their lives. We will examine the work I



have developed with colleagues that will hopefully provide a different perspective to those young people who are often demonised by society.

Facilitator: Lyn Nichols - see Speakers & Presenters page.

23. Nursing Care to Maintain Health in Today's Children.

This workshop will include an introduction related to the day's theme followed by interactive exercises, discussion and examples of suitable external applications.

Facilitator: Tessa Therklison is an anthroposophical nurse and reflexologist, with a broad interest in research and education in relation to external applications.

24. The Outdoor Classroom

Participants will engage in simple industrial craft processes in order to experience the therapeutic value of craft movements. The outdoor classroom can be used as a model for working with behavioural disorders such as ADHD, ODD and autism.

Facilitator: Jonathan Jordan has had 10 years experience in curative education and has been a convenor of the course in Curative Education and Social Therapy at Hohepa as well as a contributor to various courses at Taruna College.
